General Information

Thank you for your interest in submitting a session proposal for the Annual Midwest Association for Latin American Studies (MALAS) Conference titled, **Democracy, Human Rights, and Environmental Justice in Latin America: Past, Present, and Future / Democracia, derechos humanos y justicia ambiental en América Latina: pasado, presente y futuro.**

The 2019 MALAS Conference will take place on October 10-12, 2019, in Springfield, Illinois, at the campus of the University of Illinois Springfield.

The program will consist primarily of presentations selected through this open call for submissions. Depending on the topic to be discussed, the presentations may be in English or Spanish. In addition, there will be invited speakers and panel discussions.

The 2019 conference marks the 69th edition of the conferences. This conference provides an opportunity for scholars (faculty, researchers, students) in Latin American matters to contribute towards better understanding of all things Latin American, from literature to politics to human rights, and more.

Proposal Deadline

The deadline for submission is <u>Friday, August 30, 2019 at 11:59 p.m.</u> Central Time. But, we would appreciate receiving the papers much earlier than the deadline.

Submission Formats

<u>Individual Papers:</u> Individual papers may be submitted for consideration. The presenters will be included as part of a concurrent session according to topic.

<u>Concurrent Session</u>: Concurrent sessions may involve a minimum of two and up to four panelists in the presentation and should include discussion of content and materials. Concurrent sessions are 90 minutes and may address a multitude of topics about Latin America, as the MALAS conference is multidisciplinary in nature. Presenters are encouraged to collaborate with colleagues and professionals from different campus units/offices and/or with colleagues from other institutions for greater consideration. Potential presenters may submit their papers individually and not as part of a panel per se; the committee selecting the papers will determine in what session to place the presenter.

<u>Workshop:</u> A workshop provides an opportunity for the presenter(s) to involve participants in interaction including hands-on activities and discussions. Workshops are 90 minutes. These sessions should include the presentation of appropriate material and allow ample time for participant engagement, discussion, and action planning, as appropriate. Workshop submissions are expected to include a chair and have no more than four (4) total presenters (including the chair).

Keep in Mind

- Abstract word limits: The Papers and Sessions Committee may reject a submission without review if the abstract or description exceeds the word limits specified in the session submission application.
- Participation limits: To promote broad participation in the annual conference, an individual may not appear as primary presenter or chair on more than two submissions. An individual may not appear as a participating presenter on more than three submissions.
- Participation limits on session submissions: Session submissions for panel presentations are limited to four (4) participants per session. The number of participants includes the chair, presenters, and any panelists.
- If your session is accepted, the following apply:
 - All participants in a session (chairs and panelists where applicable) must register for the annual conference by the date indicated in the pre-registration from.
 - \circ $\;$ The registration must include full payment of the conference fee.
 - Participants that fail to register and do not pay the conference fee by the indicated date will not be included in the program booklet and will not be allowed to present, as well as to participate at other conference events, including attending sessions.
 - It is requested that Chairs/primary presenters submit any final presentation and materials to the MALAS Annual Conference Committee by October 1, 2019.
 - Presenters are expected to be in attendance at the Annual Conference to present at the scheduled session(s).

ABOUT THE THEME

According to Freedom House, the Americas are second only to Western Europe in levels of freedom and respect for human rights. This shows major progress, particularly if compared to Latin America of the Cold War era when 17 of 20 countries in the region were rule by military regimes or other authoritarian systems. Nonetheless and despite the overwhelming number of electoral democracies (19 of 20 at the turn of the millennium), the quality of Latin American democracies is still in question. Indeed, violent crime and populist governments with authoritarian tendencies have been a problem more recently. Democracy has collapsed in Venezuela and Nicaragua and is in serious trouble in countries such as Bolivia and Honduras. In El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, and Brazil, criminal organizations are threatening the rule of law and weakening democracy (Freedom House 2018). In 2017, more environmental activists were killed in Latin America than anywhere else in the world (Parker Asmann 2018). This tragic statistic emphasizes just one of the multitude of environmental inequalities linked to decades of neoliberal environmental management and development processes in the region. In some cases, such as the recent attacks against environmental defenders, pervasive global patterns of consumption and territorialization are linked directly to state violence (Hanson 2019). In addition, parts of the region lack such basic human rights as freedoms of association, assembly, and the press, and suffer from violence against journalists (Freedom House 2018). Despite these troubles, almost everywhere in the region, citizens are organizing and mobilizing to defend civic freedoms, fight for social justice and equality, defend democratic values, and demand environmental action. It still remains to be seen whether democracy, human rights, and environmental justice will prevail over authoritarianism and demagoguery in 21st century Latin America.

The 2019 conference theme may be addressed through social sciences, as well as literature, history, arts, and popular cultures, among many other disciplinary or interdisciplinary approaches.

MALAS invites scholars, students and researchers from different areas of the social sciences to submit a 150 to 200-word abstract in English or Spanish addressing one or more of the topics suggested above, although other themes are also welcomed.
